First Reading

¹²The word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart.

¹³And before him no creature is hidden, but all are naked and laid bare to the eyes of the one to whom we must render an account. ¹⁴Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. ¹⁵For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. ¹⁶Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

Gospel Reading

¹⁷As Jesus was setting out on a journey, a man ran up and knelt before him, and asked him, 'Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' ¹⁸Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. ¹⁹You know the commandments: "You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; You shall not defraud; Honour your father and mother."' ²⁰He said to Jesus, 'Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth.' ²¹Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, 'You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' ²²When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions.

²³Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, 'How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!' ²⁴And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, 'Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! ²⁵It is easier for a camel to go

through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.' ²⁶They were greatly astounded and said to one another, 'Then who can be saved?' ²⁷Jesus looked at them and said, 'For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible.'

²⁸Peter began to say to him, 'Look, we have left everything and followed you.' ²⁹Jesus said, 'Truly I tell you there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, ³⁰who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age – houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields – but with persecutions – and in the age to come eternal life. ³¹But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first.'

Thought for the week...

Do you have a Bible at home? More than one? How old or new is it / are they? Where do you keep it / them? Handy or on a shelf? How well thumbed is it/ are they? (assuming a hard copy rather than a digital Bible – yes, you can get them!). A former bishop of Oxford, when he visited clergy at home used to go into the study and run his finger along a book checking for dust and to see if it had been used (or not)!

How do you use your Bible? How do you 'see' it? An old book, though perhaps in a modern translation, words on a page, wise advice?



The writer of the letter to the Hebrews says that the Bible, the word of God, is 'living and active'. If we view the Bible in that way, it can be a real help in everyday life.

God speaks to us in a variety of ways - through prayer, through nature – and through the Bible. It is a real joy that some of us are able to engage with three passages from the Bible each day at Morning Prayer: a Psalm, and readings form the Old and New Testaments. Sometimes a word or phrase may jump out at an individual to offer guidance, assurance or challenge. They are living words. They speak to us today. Where is your Bible? How well thumbed is it??
