The Collect

O God, forasmuch as without you we are not able to please you; mercifully grant that your Holy Spirit may in all things direct and rule our hearts; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion

Holy and blessed God, you have fed us with the body and blood of your Son and filled us with your Holy Spirit: may we honour you, not only with our lips but in lives dedicated to the service of Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading

¹My brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.

²I urge Euodia and I urge Syntyche to be of the same mind in the Lord. ³Yes, and I ask you also, my loyal companion, help these women, for they have struggled beside me in the work of the gospel, together with Clement and the rest of my co-workers, whose names are in the book of life.

⁴Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. ⁵Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. ⁶Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. ⁸Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. ⁹Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you.

Gospel Reading

¹Once more Jesus spoke to the chief priests and Pharisees in parables, saying: ²The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. ³He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. ⁴Again he sent other slaves, saying, "Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet." ⁵But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, ⁶while the rest

seized his slaves, maltreated them, and killed them. ⁷The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. ⁸Then he said to his slaves, "The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. ⁹Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet." ¹⁰Those slaves went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests.

¹¹But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe, ¹²and he said to him, "Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?" And he was speechless. ¹³Then the king said to the attendants, "Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." ¹⁴For many are called, but few are chosen.'

Thought for the week:

In the light of current international violence, the parable in today's gospel can make for uncomfortable reading. Jesus is continuing his attack on the religious leaders of the day for not recognising and welcoming him as the Messiah that they have been waiting for.

Images of the expected Messianic banquet offer the background for this story – and it a story so we cannot expect every detail to be clear (e.g. just where did the 'other' street guests get their wedding clothes from?).



In the story Jesus compares the kingdom of heaven to a wedding feast (familiar to his hearers) which the invited guests rudely, and in cases violently, refuse to attend. Those to whom Jesus has come, will not accept him. Those drawn in from the streets – the outcasts, the unloved and so on, demonstrate that God's love reaches out to all people, wherever they are and whatever they are. The kingdom of heaven is to be inclusive. Don't we love to emphasise that today.

And so we rail against the fact that the man who has not worn his 'wedding best' is thrown out. But perhaps we should stop, and think. Jesus is not 'meek and mild', he is loving but also demanding. Yes, God his Father loves everyone where they are but that does not mean that he fully accepts their behaviour or attitude. Jesus is very clear that there are certain behaviours expected of his disciples and in the parable this man has not lived up to them.

Jesus welcomes 'tax collectors and sinners' – the outcasts of society, but he wants them to change. He welcomes the sick - but he wants to heal them.

We need to know that Jesus loves every person, each one of us, but maybe he is also asking us to change to live in different ways too.

- For Sam, as she develops our work with children and families.
- For peace in Ukraine and Russia, and of Sudan, and also in Armenia and Ethiopia.
- For a new church music leader.

- For our growth in faith and for the developing Alpha team.
- That we may each play our part in the ministry of our church and care for its building.
- For our care for creation, giving thanks that we have achieved the Bronze Eco Church Award, and looking to the next step.

From the PCC

Notes of key points from the recent PCC meeting:

- Our three annual charities (Foodshare, Embrace rebuilding after the Turkish earthquake, and Green Christians – Arocha Ghana) would be retained for another year so that they can really benefit and we can learn more about them and engage fully. The fourth quarter of giving would also be as this year, split between Inclusive church, Toilet twining in Lors and New Brainstorm School, Uganda.
- The bench in memory of John Cox will be dedicated on 11th November.
- An advert would be placed for a church cleaner (paid for 2 hours a fortnight)

- Not the Summer Fair raised around £1180.
- A Parish Share increase of 4% for 2024 was approved £66.500 from £64,000. The usual gift day would be held on the Patronal festival and stewardship renewal on 19th November.
- A firm of Consulting Engineers had visited, met the Heat and Light working group, and caried out a survey of the church. They will produce a report advising on best ways forward to replace boiler and lights to save money and become net zero carbon.
- The Heat and Light, and Churchyard working groups were constituted as formal subcommittees of the PCC for the time being.
- RBWM had appointed a contractor to undertake some tree work in the churchyard.
- An Alpha course would be run in the new year, along with further nurture opportunities.
- 10 Bibles would be purchased for use in church.
- Our Patronal festival (22nd October) would be designated Back to Church day and all are encouraged to invite people to church that day. There would be refreshments after the service.
- Revd Sally reported on the Living in Love and Faith process (blessings on the marriages of LGBTQIA+ couples) and it was agreed to invite people to sign cards of prayerful support to our bishops.
- A letter of congratulations would be sent to our school following an outstanding Ofsted inspection.
- 'no smoking on this site' signs would be placed on the church railings.

Our sponsored charities

Embrace the Middle East, one of the charities St Luke's is supporting this year, has on its website four very enlightening webinars, "Conversations with Middle East Christians" about the daily lives of people in Palestine-Israel, Lebanon, Iraq and Egypt, and the work being done there by Christian organisations.
