# Week commencing: 21<sup>st</sup> August Trinity 10

Our service on Sunday is a Parish Communion service at 10 am, in church and on zoom.

#### The Collect

Let your merciful ears, O Lord, be open to the prayers of your humble servants; and that they may obtain their petitions make them to ask such things as shall please you; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

## The Post Communion Prayer

God of our pilgrimage, you have willed that the gate of mercy should stand open for those who trust in you: look upon us with your favour that we who follow the path of your will may never wander from the way of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

## A Reading from the letter to the Hebrews

18 You have not come to something that can be touched, a blazing fire, and darkness, and gloom, 19 and a tempest, and the sound of a trumpet, and a voice whose words made the hearers beg that not another word be spoken to them. 20 (For they could not endure the order that was given, 'If even an animal touches the mountain, it shall be stoned to death.' 21 Indeed, so terrifying was the sight that Moses said, 'I tremble with fear.') 22 But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, 23 and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, 24 and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

25 See that you do not refuse the one who is speaking; for if they did not escape when they refused the one who warned them on earth, how much less will we escape if we reject the one who warns from heaven! 26 At that time his voice shook the earth; but now he has promised, 'Yet once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heaven.' 27 This phrase, 'Yet once more,' indicates the removal of what is shaken – that is, created things – so that what cannot be shaken may remain. 28 Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us give thanks, by which we offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe; 29 for indeed our God is a consuming fire.

Hebrews 12. 18-29

#### The Gospel reading

10 Now he was teaching in one of the synagogues on the sabbath. 11 And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. 12 When Jesus saw her, he called her over and said, 'Woman, you are set free from your ailment.' 13 When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. 14 But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, 'There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on

those days and be cured, and not on the sabbath day.' 15 But the Lord answered him and said, 'You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the sabbath until his ox or his donkey from the manger, and lead it away to give it water? 16 And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the sabbath day?' 17 When he said this, all his opponents were put to shame; and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things that he was doing.

#### Thought for the week:

Bracha Lavee is an Israeli artist with a huge portfolio of beautiful work (paintings, collage and needlepoint) based on the Holy Land and Jewish family life, much of which inspires peace and reflection. This piece, *Beautiful Shabbat*, is one example.

The sabbath, seventh day, day of rest (Friday evening - Saturday

evening for Jews, Sunday for Christians) is, according to the Bible, a gift from God. It is to be enjoyed and revelled in. a day to rest and do good, to worship unhampered by everyday needs. The sabbath was often seen as a 'bride', beautiful and lovely.

By the time of Jesus many rules had grown up around the sabbath, ensuing that it was kept holy to God, but making life very challenging for ordinary 'Jews in the pews'. The freedom and joy of shabbat had given way to frustration and constriction.


Jesus healed a woman – in a synagogue – on a sabbath. He had broken so many of the extra rules and yet he had retuned life to a woman who desperately needed it. this was not the only sabbath healing, nor the only time that Jesus infringed some of the laws that had been added to the basic Ten Commandments which were about loving God and other people.

This might cause us to stop and ask ourselves at least two questions

- How do we keep our Sabbath / Sunday? Do we have a day to revel in and enjoy freedoms?
- What rules and restrictions have we placed on areas of our own lives and those of others, which do not actually serve for good, but rather prevent people from living the 'life in all its fulness; that Jesus offers?

#### Prayer suggestions for this week:

- That we may examine our own lives so that we can live ourselves, and help others, to live fully in Jesus' freedom.
- For the people of Ukraine and Russia, and for the UN. For all world leaders. For peace.
- For our government and the contest for leadership of the Conservative party.
- For children and families over the summer holidays; for our ministry with children and for our plans to appoint a Children and Family Leader.
- For folk to take on the role of verger and of flower co-ordinator for our church.
- For our music team, and for an assistant organist.
   For our care for creation and sustainable living, for our work towards becoming and Ecochurch
- For the international refugees currently living in Maidenhead and the people who are supporting them
