¹⁷After Abram's return from the defeat of Chedorlaomer and the kings who were with him, the king of Sodom went out to meet him at the Valley of Shaveh (that is, the King's Valley). ¹⁸And King Melchizedek of Salem brought out bread and wine; he was priest of God Most High. ¹⁹He blessed him and said, 'Blessed be Abram by God Most High, maker of heaven and earth; ²⁰and blessed be God Most High, who has delivered your enemies into your hand!' And Abram gave him one-tenth of everything.

Gospel Reading

¹On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. ²Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. ³When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' ⁴And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' ⁵His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' ⁶Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. ⁷Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. ⁸He

said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. ⁹When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, ¹⁰'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' ¹¹Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Thought for the week:

I often joke that the changing of water into wine is my favourite of Jesus' miracles. Someone gave me a plaque which reads, 'If there is no wine in heaven, I'm not going'. I don't think I'd take it that far! But it is true to say that for many people, wine is a symbol of celebration and this first miracle that Jesus enacted was full of symbolism.

William Temple suggests that there are two meanings to this miracle: he wrote: firstly, the changing of water into wine demonstrates the change effected by the touch of Jesus upon the lives of Christians, and secondly, it shows that there is always better to come.



That is all very well but, as we look at our world, we don't always feel like celebrating, or that there is better to come. Perhaps we need to remember that we can't actually experience the lavish grace of God unless it is placed alongside the diversity of human sufferings. The change that happens in our lives is by the grace of God which acts in and through the mess that is going on around us. Jesus lived at a time of hardship for his people. The wedding he attended took place in an area under Roman occupation, with harsh taxes and brutal treatment of local people by the Romans. None of these things were the fault of the ordinary people. Yet life carried on and in the midst of the mess Jesus offered more – lavishly more – in the wine that he provided.

Unlike the wine at Cana, that transformation of our lives is not instant but gradual. It takes a whole lifetime. And always God is faithful and almost imperceptibly, by each thing that we encounter, we are slowly transformed to become more and more the people he intends us to be. Until one day we do attain the heavenly glory that we will share with him – and saints and angels - in person – hopefully with wine too!

Prayer suggestions for this week:

- For those who are living on the breadline and on our streets, for shelter and support
- For the people of Israel and Palestine, for an end to the violence there and for strength for all those who are suffering loss and fear. For our sisters and brothers in the Jewish and Muslim communities of our own town, especially those worried for loved ones.
- For a de-escalation of the situation in the Middle East.
- For peace in Ukraine and Russia, and of Sudan, and also in Armenia and Ethiopia.
- For our schools as they return to work, and for Mrs Sam Stevenson as she takes up the role of Headteacher at St. Luke's.
- For more children and families to come along to Sunday services / children's activities. And for Sam Fiordelisi as she leads our children and family ministry.

- For a new church music leader.
- For our growth in faith and for the developing Alpha team. For God to be moving guests to join the course.


