The Collect

Almighty Lord and everlasting God, we beseech you to direct, sanctify and govern both our hearts and bodies in the ways of your laws and the works of your commandments; that through your most mighty protection, both here and ever, we may be preserved in body and soul; through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion Prayer

Strengthen for service, Lord, the hands that have taken holy things; may the ears which have heard your word be deaf to clamour and dispute; may the tongues which have sung your praise be free from deceit; may the eyes which have seen the tokens of your love shine with the light of hope; and may the bodies which have been fed with your body be refreshed with the fullness of your life; glory to you for ever.

First Reading

¹¹Remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called 'the uncircumcision' by those who are called 'the circumcision' – a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands – ¹²remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. ¹³But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. ¹⁴For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. ¹⁵He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, ¹⁶and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. ¹⁷So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; ¹⁸for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. ¹⁹So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, ²⁰built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. ²¹In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; ²²in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling-place for God.

Ephesians 2.11-end

Gospel Reading

The apostles returned from their mission. ³⁰They gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. ³¹He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. ³²And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. ³³Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. ³⁴As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things. ⁵³When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. ⁵⁴When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, ⁵⁵and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. ⁵⁶And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the market-places, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all *Mark 6.30-34,53-end*

Thought for the week

There is huge energy in this week's gospel reading in the people

with whom the apostles have been engaging and who have been soaking up Jesus' teaching – and his miracles. Jesus and his disciples need a break. As the little group set off for a quiet place by boat the crowds could see where they were headed and beat them to it – popping up a bit like cartoon characters – we're here! And what was Jesus' response?

Mark tells us, that he had compassion on them because they looked lost, helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Those whose responsibility it was to care for them were so tied up with their own cares that the people had been left to their own devices. And Jesus' heart went out to them as he turned away from rest and taught them. He gave more of himself – as much as they needed.

The Greek word used here carries the idea of being moved to the very depths of ones being (a bit like the moving of ones bowels!) Jesus does not just feel sorry for the people, he recognises their deep need, he feels totally for them - he doesn't say, 'oh I know just how you feel'- despite being all in himself, he demonstrates his compassion in active assistance.

But he doesn't feed them immediately – he recognises that their deepest need is to be taught – to be offered the opportunity to learn more about God so that they can know him better for themselves. THEN he feeds them (we miss out that part in the reading in the lectionary reading) and then he heals.

As we look at the people around us – particularly today in an increasingly uncertain environment we see what Jesus saw, people who are lost and confused and aimlessly wandering through life, with no purpose or hope. We see this on the TV news and we see it on our doorsteps.

All of us as disciples of Christ are called to respond as he did – to be moved in the centre of our being, to have compassion and to reach out to them. And our first response should not be to give aid, or to be kind but to teach – just as Jesus did. He saw 2000 years ago that the deepest need was hope, nothing has changed today and we have hope to offer in our own stories of faith, in the God whom, we are here to worship. We are called to be shepherds in this parish. To share the good news of the gospel and to teach people about it, and then to feed and heal.
