The Feast of Christ the King

We have come to the last Sunday in the church year as we celebrate the feast of Christ the King. This week we have a **9.30am** Parish Communion. There will be an activity for children available during the service. All are warmly invited. Our service will start earlier this week to allow for those representing us at **Mitzvah Day** to arrive in good time.

Our Sundays at Six is a Taize service at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Cox Green. If you have not been to a Taize service why not come along to experience the gentle quietness of this simple service with accessible chants, space and silence as we prepare for Advent.

Post Communion Prayer

Thought for the week...

Our model of sovereignty as a nation has changed in the last couple of years. Many of us knew only the leadership of a Queen (a true model of servant leadership, whatever you think about the idea of a British monarchy). Now we have a King, who follows in his mother's footsteps but is still very much his own person. The King model is also closer to the



Biblical model of sovereignty and perhaps helps us to understand the theology of God as King. There is, though, a crucial difference. God is not just a national figurehead. God is universal, omniscient, omnipotent... and all the other 'oms' you can think of. This king is utterly transcendent and above all things. As one hymn says, 'to be worshipped and adored'.

And yet... this king also wears a crown of thorns. In Jesus, the transcendent God becomes immanent, one of us, alongside us and suffering with us. Jesus our king models most perfectly the servant leader, who 'came not to be served, but to serve' (Mark 10.45).

As we come to the end of the church year and look again to the next, to what God has in store for each of us for the immediate and longer-term future, how do we respond to God's kingship, to the king whose crown is of thorns? With awe? With love? with service? in prayer? In imitation? The feast of Christ the King offers a time to reflect and to respond.


