The Collect

God of all grace, your Son Jesus Christ fed the hungry with the bread of his life and the word of his kingdom: renew your people with your heavenly grace, and in all our weakness sustain us by your true and living bread; who is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

First Reading

²³The former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; ²⁴but he holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues for ever. ²⁵Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.

And they called the blind man, saying to him, 'Take heart; get up, he is calling you.' ⁵⁰So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. ⁵¹Then Jesus said to him, 'What do you want me to do for you?' Thought for the week...

This weekend we keep Bible Sunday – the last Sunday after Trinity in the church's calendar. From now on we turn to All Saints and the Kingdom season and we begin to prepare for Advent and the new start to the church year. And as we do so, we are reminded today of the absolute centrality of the

Bible in our faith, our belief, our worship, our life together

and our daily living. Were it not for the Bible we would be impoverished in guidance about how to lives our lives and in our knowledge of God.

Of course, God can be known to us through creation, through the natural world, through personal and corporate prayer, through worship and through miracles. And God is supremely manifest to us in Jesus – his word made flesh as the Word of God.

How best do we know about Jesus? The Bible records for all time his story – and also what went before to prepare people for him, and a little of what came after as the people who accepted him as God incarnate grew in number and became the church. So it is a history book in a way (about divine revelation)

Some people view the Bible as a kind of manual for life – a maker's handbook. Hmm... I'm not very good at reading the instruction manual when I buy a new anything. I learn how to use it by trial and error – fiddling with it and making mistakes. The book is usually too big, and I am too lazy to read it, or the language is too complicated (and now it is often online anyway). So, I make mistakes and might even mess it up.

I guess the same could be said of the Bible. And some people don't read the bible because it is so huge it looks daunting, or the language is difficult to understand, or it feels out of date. Do we feel a bit like that as Christians, and if so what are we going to do about it? The Bible is our

main line to God. We hear it in worship, we use it in prayer and it does guide us in life – though we have to interpret it for ourselves, prayerfully and with help from wise church leaders and others.

Jesus himself read the OT scriptures, he knew them inside out and he knew how they would help him in his daily life. He also knew that he fulfilled them. As today's collect reminds us, we are called also to read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest God's word that we may have life, as Jesus promises, life in all its fullness.

Prayer suggestions for this week:

- That we may be faithful in reading God's word and applying it to our lives.
- For the people of the whole Middle East, for an end to the violence there.
- For our care for creation
- For the various nurture activities offered this autumn.

Love Christmas

The PCC has agreed that we will take part in Love Christmas again this year (having had a year or two off).

Sandy from St. Peter's writes: It was a joy to partner with other churches on Love Christmas last year, where together we reached over 750 families and individuals facing challenging circumstances; and shared with them gifts of love and kindness.

This will be year 5 of Love Christmas and each year we try to refine the project to maximise impact and strengthen links between partner churches and their communities. Following feedback and reflection on both the impact and the process, this year we are proposing to give away the following:

Asylum Seekers based in the Holiday Inn:

• 220 bags to include: £15 Supermarket voucher plus biscuits Families facing a difficult Christmas to be distributed through schools where there is a need and where the churches involved have a direct link:

• 500 bags to include: £10 supermarket voucher plus Christmas treats

Isolated elderly or those in the community facing hardship (10 bags per partner church): • 80 bags to include: Christmas food (biscuits, chocolates; cheese biscuits; chutney etc)

This totals 800 bags, each of £20. Therefore, the total projected cost of Love Christmas 2024 is £16,000. Each bag will also contain a gift card explaining who the gifts are from and the partner churches involved. Obviously, this plan is subject to the level of support received, though we trust that God will generously provide!

If we are unable to raise the target amount, we will first reduce the value of each bag to £15, before reducing the number of bags delivered.

It is a joy to partner with you to reach those in need in our communities. And not only is it a blessing to work together, the impact we have is multiplied!

World Day of Prayer
