The Collect

Almighty and ever-living God, clothed in majesty, whose beloved Son was this day presented in the Temple, as a human like us: grant that we may be presented to you with pure and clean hearts, by your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever

Post Communion

Lord God, the springing source of everlasting light, pour into the hearts of your faithful people the brilliance of your eternal splendour, that we, who by these kindling flames light up this temple to your glory, may have the darkness of our souls dispelled, and so be counted worthy to stand before you in that eternal city where you live and reign, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever

A reading from the prophet Malachi

The Gospel Reading

22When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. 23(as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), 24and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.'

25Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. 26It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. 27Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, 28Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

29'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; 30for my eyes have seen your salvation,

31which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

32a light for revelation to the Gentiles

and for glory to your people Israel.'

33And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. 34Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed 35so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed – and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

36There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, 37then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. 38At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

39When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. 40The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him. *Luke 2. 22-40*

Thought for the week

A Canticle for Candlemas To accompany A celebration of St Brigid (1st Feb)



Halfway between nativity, With the turning of the year, And halfway on to Passiontide, When snowdrops first appear At Candlemas, at her own time, Comes Brigid of Kildare, Apostle to her/our people, Her own concern and care. At Brigid's well there stand five stones – And each one tells its tale – Have fifteen centuries endured Their message to unveil. Their ancient words still speak to us As if to our own age. May their eternal witness still Our hearts and minds engage.

The first stone says, 'There's food for all If you protect the earth.' Her bounty is for everyone, None needs to suffer dearth. But woe to those who plunder And keep from those in need, Destroying God's own providence For the sake of their own greed. The second stone says, 'Work for peace.' So do not strive for war, And reconcile the nations To God's own holy law. May those within our nation Who stir up strife and pain Treat all with fellow-feeling And work for peace again.

The third stone says 'Befriend the poor' For they are Christ's own folk. He often comes in beggar's guise And bears the common yoke. To thread a needle with a rope Is easier by far Than rich to enter heaven's gate And stand at judgment's bar.

'A welcome for the stranger' The fourth stone bids us make Within our hearts, our lands, our homes For our dear Saviour's sake. The harlot and the outcast Were welcomed by our Lord. All wrongly held and fleeing wrong Are heartened by this word. The last stone bids us, 'Meditate' And seek the Spirit's voice Within the still, small voice of God, And calm the wild world's noise. For she will teach us clearly What no ear has ever heard, No eye e'er seen, no hand e'er touch'd: God's everlasting word.

In Brigid's ancient oaken grove Near the Curragh of Kildare An everlasting flame was kept Within her people's care – The symbol of the Spirit Who came with tongues of fire. May that same Spirit dwell in us And all our hearts inspire.

FOR Brigid's generosity, And kindness to the poor, Her reconciling acts for peace Are still worth striving for. She first brought her Lord's message To country and to town, Now lies within Downpatrick At rest in the County Down



From the PCC

Key notes from this week's PCC meeting:

- The organ project (with the exception of essential maintenance) will go on hold until a new Director of Music is appointed
- The three recipients of our charitable giving from last year are:
 - o o Tearfund- to support Ukrainian refugees (international)
 - o o A Rocha-to support climate awareness (national)
 - • Brett Foundation Fuel bank project-to support food and fuel poverty (local)
- The PCC had received a legacy of £255,000 from the estate of the late Johanna Raffan.
- Approval was given for role of Children and Family Leader to be put out to advert (c.£50, see advert below).
- Approval was given for 5 extra hour admin weekly (Thursday and Friday mornings)
- A faculty is being sought for a bench in memory of the late John Cox in the rear churchyard
- PCC fees for the coming year were approved. It was noted that it us currently costing around £75 per hour to heat the church (£25 pre pandemic).
- The boiler would be repaired further and the Fabric group would begin to explore future heating options.
- An Eco day will be held on 4th March (shared with All Saints and Cox Green)
- The Christmas Tree Festival had raised £4,903.29 for the church and just over £2000 for the nominated charity- Alexander Devine Hospice.
- A grant of just over £2000 had been received from the Diocese of Oxford to support heating and lighting costs.

HINES MEADOW CAR PARK

The council is proposing to charge for parking in the Hines Meadow car park on Sundays. This is not good as many families park there to attend church and may not be able to afford it in future. They proposed this once before and we (CTiM)opposed it, as did others. They withdrew the proposal at that time. There is a consultation open for the next week. As you will be aware, the council has been allocated funding through the DWP Household Support Fund, to provide support to vulnerable households, to help with significantly rising living costs. We would like to ask for your help, in making sure that residents who are in financial need, are aware that they may be able to receive a one-off cash payment of £145 to support them this winter. We are keen to work with partners like yourselves to reach residents who are in our target groups for the Fund, especially those who may not yet have heard about the scheme. To help raise awareness with those in need, we will shortly be sending you:

- A flyer version of the above please feel free to print as necessary to help reach those individuals in need who are not online.

To access support, residents should speak to one of our nine partner organisations. Our partners are responsible for identifying residents for the scheme, and will provide them with a Unique Reference Number, which is needed to submit an application
