The Collect

Almighty God, who inspired your apostle Saint Peter to confess Jesus as Christ and Son of the living God: build up your Church upon this rock, that in unity and peace it may proclaim one truth and follow one Lord, your Son our Saviour Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

who on the day of Pentecost
sent your Holy Spirit to the apostles
with the wind from heaven
and in tongues of flame,
filling them with joy and boldness
to preach the gospel:
by the power of the same Spirit
strengthen us to witness to your truth

First Reading

Brothers and sisters: ¹⁹It is a credit to you if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. ²⁰If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, where is the credit in that? But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. ²¹For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps. ²²'He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth.' ²³When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. ²⁴He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. ²⁵For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls. 1 Peter 2. 19-25

will not prevail against it. 19I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.'

Thought for the week:

Banias is a ruined city. Way up in the Golan Heights, the river Jordan bubbles up from streams in the shady groves there and then flows over a vast waterfall as it starts its journey through the 'Holy Land'. In its heyday this was a bustling Greek city with many grottos to a variety of gods



on its outskirts – especially to the god Pan – hence its original name – Panyas.

You can still see the grottos today – in fact they are almost all that is left of the city. Cut into the sheer limestone cliff face something of the splendour of the place remains, in contrast to the cool wooded shade below, by the water.

It was here that Jesus brought his disciples on a kind of retreat. He needed to spend time with them and to help to understand their role in the developing and growing Kingdom of God. He was starting their preparation for life without his physical presence and support.

Surrounded by magnificent rock hewn edifices, to a rather fickle deity, he asked them who people thought he was, and who they thought he was. And it was Peter – clumsy, impetuous, fickle himself Peter, who proclaimed what we might term the first Christian creed: you are the Christ, the son of the living God.

Jesus' response might have chilled Peter in fear: 'and you are Peter' – and – looking at the ancient rocks around and recalling that Petros in Greek means rock – 'on THIS rock I will build my church'. We know that Peter was not the obvious choice to lead this new movement of faith. But we also know that despite all that followed Peter did it, with the help of the Holy Spirit – and on Sunday we celebrate his feast day and thank God for his call and his ministry – the rock came good and provided the model for 2000 years to come.

And that is good news for each of us. As we look at Peter we see that God can use imperfect people to further His kingdom.

To what might God be calling each of us, however imperfect we feel?


Calling cooks and Coffee makers...
