Readings for Sunday

Many were baptized and were added to the community. ⁴²They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

⁴³Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. ⁴⁴All who believed were together and had all things in common; ⁴⁵they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. ⁴⁶Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, ⁴⁷praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved. *Acts 2.42-end*

The Gospel reading

Jesus said to the Pharisees: 'Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. 'The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. 'The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. 'When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. 'They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers.' 'Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

⁷So again Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. ⁸All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. ⁹I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. ¹⁰The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.' *John 10. 1-10*

Thought for the week



In May 2017 I was in Jerusalem for a week. As I walked along the ridge of the old city one evening I heard a sound of tinkling bells and looked down into the valley of Gehenna to see a shepherd leading his flock home for the night, with one limping along at the back. This beautiful pastoral imagery was right in the centre of the city and I suddenly realised that it as also the fourth Sunday of Easter – Good Shepherd Sunday.

The vision before me brought home clearly the model of the Good Shepherd – leading his sheep home and going back for the last, frail one. Gehenna valley below me was also known

as 'the valley of the shadow of death' and so Psalm 23 also came to mind: 'though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death you are with me...'.

In the time of Jesus shepherds did not carry the pastoral image we assign them now. They were seen as dirty outsiders of society and unreliable. Yet to their sheep they were to be relied on totally. They knew every sheep in the flock and they cared wholly for them – however mucky they got! Every night the shepherd lay down across the entrance to the stone sheepfold – and became the gate or door to keep them in and protect them.

Jesus knew what he was doing when he called himself the gate for the sheep, and later in John 10, the Good Shepherd. He had observed and grasped the care and tenderness with which the shepherds cared for every one of their flocks and the lengths that they went to in order to keep them safe.

He remains our Good Shepherd, our Gate, our protector today – for every one of us – even the stragglers, just like the modern day shepherd that I saw in Jerusalem.
