Week Commencing: 31st March, Easter Day

Everyone is warmly invited to join us for worship this Easter Sunday. We have an 8.00am Holy Communion service, with Lighting of the Paschal candle followed by coffee and croissants. At 10.00am we have a Festal Holy Communion (also on zoom) and blessing of the Easter Garden. There will be an Easter Egg hunt for children during this service followed by refreshments for all afterwards.

The Collect

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise and honour, glory and might, now and in all eternity.

Post Communion Prayer

God of Life, who for our redemption gave your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross, and by his glorious resurrection have delivered us from the power of our enemy: grant us so to die daily to sin, that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his risen life; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading

³⁴Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius. 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. ³⁷That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁸how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴²He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.' *Acts 10.34-43*

The Gospel Reading

¹When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. ²And very early on the first day of the week, when the

sun had risen, they went to the tomb. ³They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' ⁴When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. ⁵As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. ⁶But he said to them, 'Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. ⁷But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you.' ⁸So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid. *Mark 16.1-8*

Thought for the week

Today's gospel reading is the most unusual (and least often read) account of the resurrection. The original end of Mark ends, as we read above: *the women* 'went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid'.

At first glance the women's lack of action might make us feel sad, frustrated, even annoyed: why did they not do what the angel told them?

We know the whole story and so perhaps we forget the sheer terror those women must have felt. They were courageous enough to set off early to anoint Jesus body (there had been no time immediately after his death). They knew there was a guard at the tomb, but they wanted to do what was right for their loved one.

It was the angel that frightened them – an encounter with the supernatural – and the empty tomb. They could cope with a dead body, but no body, and an angel - that was too much!

Perhaps we should not judge the women for their fear and their silence, rather we might be assured by it ourselves.

Sometimes God's call on us today makes us fearful, inclined to hold back or slow to act for him. The women overcame their fear and were some of the first to serve the risen Jesus. God will wait for each of us to respond to his call – and will help us overcome our fears.

- For the people of Israel and Palestine, for an end to the violence there and for strength for all those who are suffering loss and fear. For our sisters and brothers in the Jewish and Muslim communities of our own town, and for all who are keeping Ramadan.
- For a de-escalation of the situation in the Middle East.
- For peace in Ukraine and Russia, and of Sudan, and also in Armenia and Ethiopia.
- For a new church music leader.
- For our growth in faith and for the Alpha team and guests.

What were the services like, and how did congregations respond? And what about the clergy? In his recent and highly-acclaimed book, *Going to Church in Medieval England*, (it was a *Daily Telegraph* Book of the Year in 2021), Professor Orme explored all these questions and more, with a wealth of vignettes that brought the story vividly to life – examples of often colourful but sometimes dingy churches, mostly (though not always) educated and conscientious clergy, and congregations of variable attentiveness. Some folk, it seemed, 'come only for the manner [*i.e.* the fashion] and for no devotion, nor for no profit of their soul, and such fall soon asleep', though for many, attendance was more than a duty; there was evidently a strong and widespread belief in keeping the Sabbath holy, and people attended out of a genuine piety
