Next week we keep Remembrance Sunday with a Word service at 10.20 am and Holy Communion at 8 am.

First Reading

¹I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. ²And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. ³And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,

'See, the home of God is among mortals.

He will dwell with them;
they will be his peoples,
and God himself will be with them;

he will wipe every tear from their eyes.

Death will be no more;
mourning and crying and pain will be no more,
for the first things have passed away.'

Gospel Reading

³²When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.' ³³When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. ³⁴He said, 'Where have you laid him?' They said to him, 'Lord, come and see.' ³⁵Jesus began to weep. ³⁶So the Jews said, 'See how he loved him!' ³⁷But some of them said, 'Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?'

³⁸Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. ³⁹Jesus said, 'Take away the stone.' Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, 'Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days.' ⁴⁰Jesus said to her, 'Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?' ⁴¹So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, 'Father, I thank you for having heard me. ⁴²I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me.' ⁴³When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come out!' ⁴⁴The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, and let him go.'

Thought for the week...

There is something powerful about candles.

They can evoke an atmosphere in our homes, but they are also used by almost every faith in various ways in worship.

As autumn draws on light becomes more important and sparks of candle flames stand for hope in darkness.

Our Hindu sisters and brothers celebrate Diwali this week – fireworks and flames a reminder of the lights that guided home the hero Rama and his beloved Sita, good having overcome evil.

And we will light candles in church at our Memorial service on Sunday afternoon as we recall our own loved ones, whom we see no longer face to face. The pain of loss is real and lasting but simple actions, such as lighting a candle, can be very meaningful. The candle flame reminds us of the hope of eternal life that Jesus offers and when it burns out (we don't blow them out, we allow them to go out) then the smoke rising symbolises our prayers rising to God. Candles can bring great comfort, often through the tears.

Jesus promised, 'I am the light of the world'. Let's light candles thus autumn in solidarity with our sisters and brothers of faith, in prayer for peace in what feels like a dark world, and as beautiful tokens of love for those with whom we have shared our lives.
