The Collect

Almighty and everlasting God, you are always more ready to hear than we to pray and to give more than either we desire or deserve: pour down upon us the abundance of your mercy, forgiving us those things of which our conscience is afraid and giving us those good things which we are not worthy to ask but through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ your Son our Lord...

The Post Communion Prayer

God of all mercy, in this eucharist you have set aside our sins and given us your healing: grant that we who are made whole in Christ may bring that healing to this broken world, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord.

A Reading from the letter to Philemon

Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother, to Philemon our dear friend and co-worker, 2to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow-soldier, and to the church in your house: 3Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

4When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God 5because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith towards the Lord Jesus. 6I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. 7I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother.

8For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, 9yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love – and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. 10I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. 11Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. 12I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. 13I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; 14but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. 15Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back for ever, 16no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother – especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord.

17So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. 18If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. 19I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. 20Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. 21Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.

Philemon 1-21

The Gospel reading

25Large crowds were travelling with Jesus; and he turned and said to them, 26'Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even life itself, cannot be my disciple. 27Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple. 28For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? 29Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, 30saying, "This fellow began to build and was not able to finish." 31Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first and consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? 32If he cannot, then, while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation and asks for the terms of peace. 33So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions.'

Thought for the week:

Paul's short letter to Philemon is perhaps one of the most beautiful in the New Testament. Philemon was a friend of Paul, whose slave Onesimus, had run away and found his way to Rome. There he met Paul and gave his life to Jesus. A transformation occurred and Onesimus proved a great help to no longer as a slave but more than a slave a beloved brother

Paul whilst he was in prison for his own faith. There is a lovely play on words here – the name Onesimus means 'useless', which the slave had indeed been to Philemon. However, to Paul he had been 'useful' and so he no longer lived up to that derogatory name.

Paul is keen to send him back to Philemon so that he may be useful to him, and he writes to encourage Philemon to forgive him and take him back – still as a slave but now also as a Christian brother.

Wouldn't you love to know Philemon's response? We don't have it, sadly.

I do hope that he responded positively to Paul's letter and welcomed home the runaway slave. Yes, he could now be useful, but most importantly, Philemon knew himself to be 'ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven' (as a hymn puts it) by God and so he ought to welcome his slave and brother in the faith.

It is very easy for us to think of God as our 'master' and ourselves as slaves – menial in His sight. This letter reminds us that we too are 'ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven' and beloved children of God. Taking in board that knowledge can give us confidence in our own faith and knowledge that we are loved, and can remind us how to treat all others, who are also beloved children of God.
