The Collect

Almighty God,
who alone can bring order
to the unruly wills
and passions of sinful humanity:
give your people grace
so to love what you command
and to desire what you promise,
that, among the many changes of this world,
our hearts may surely there be fixed
where true joys are to be found;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

Post Communion

Merciful Father,
who gave Jesus Christ
to be for us the bread of life,
that those who come to him
should never hunger:
draw us to the Lord in faith and love,
that we may eat and drink with him
at his table in the kingdom,
where he is alive and reigns, now and for ever

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

Thus says the Lord:

1Shout out, do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet! Announce to my people their rebellion, to the house of Jacob their sins. 2Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways, as if they were a nation that practised righteousness and did not forsake the ordinance of their God; they ask of me righteous judgements, they delight to draw near to God.

3'Why do we fast, but you do not see? Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?' Look, you serve your own interest on your fast-day, and oppress all your workers.

4Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with a wicked fist. Such fasting as you do today will not make your voice heard on high. 5Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself?

Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the LORD? 6Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?

7Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin?

8Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the LORD shall be your rearguard.

9Then you shall call, and the LORD will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am. If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil,

10if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday. 11The LORD will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters never fail. 12Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in.

Isaiah 58. 1-9a

The Gospel Reading

Jesus went up the mountain and was joined by his disciples. Then he began to teach them: 13'You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot.

14You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden. 15No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. 16In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.

17Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfil. 18For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. 19Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches others to do the same, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. 20For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.'

Thought for the week



One of my favourite places on earth is Galilee, right up in the north of Israel. The place where Jesus grew up and began his ministry. In the centre of the area lies the Sea of Galilee itself, surrounded by hills. Along the top ridges of those hills are lots of little villages. At night, from one side of the lake, I love to see the lights gradually come on in each settlement as the darkness settles over the land. The lights then twinkle all night, pointing out each settlement clearly. They cannot be hidden.

Further north is the beautiful ancient small city of Safed, high on a hill. It may be that it was this city that Jesus had in mind when he said: a city built on a hill cannot be hidden. By day the city can be seen by enemies - and it can see

enemies coming - and by night it's lights shine for all to see. It is lit by many oil lamps, placed in stands for maximum use and impact.

Jesus likens this it the Christian life. He is the light of the world – he shows the right way to travel, to live. His followers also model that, helping to bring hope, life and purpose to the people of the world.

At baptism each new member of God's family is given a candle as a symbol of the light of Jesus shining out through them – not to be hidden away but to shine brightly for all around. However old we are, however long ago our baptism, the Christ light in each of us still burns, growing stronger and brighter as we grown in faith. May we shine out like those cities on hills, bringing the much needed light of Christ to the people around us.

- That we may follow Jesus faithfully and bring his light to those around us.

- For all who are worried and struggling with the cost of living, for those who are hungry, or who eat alone every day.



Local elections in May

You may have seen the new public awareness campaign, launched by the Electoral Commission,


highlighting that voters in England will need to show photographic ID in order to vote at polling stations going forwards, starting with the local elections this May.

May's elections may seem a distant thought, but it is worth voters taking note of the changes now, and checking they have appropriate ID. That way, when polling day arrives, all they have to do is remember to bring it along to the polling station. If a voter doesn't have accepted photo ID, they can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate.
