Week commencing: 5th March, Second Sunday of Lent

This week we have an All Age Holy Communion service at 10 am, to which everyone warmly invited. Children will be making a Lent tree and adults will start to watch the diocese *Come and See* videos.

The Collect

Almighty God, you show to those who are in error the light of your truth, that they may return to the way of righteousness: grant to all those who are admitted into the fellowship of Christ's religion, that they may reject those things that are contrary to their profession, and follow all such things as are agreeable to the same;...

Post Communion

Almighty God, you see that we have no power of ourselves to help ourselves: keep us both outwardly in our bodies, and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

A reading from the Book of Genesis

1The LORD said to Abram, 'Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. 2I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. 3I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed.'

4So Abram went, as the LORD had told him; and Lot went with him.

The Gospel Reading

1There was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. 2He came to Jesus by night and said to him, 'Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.' 3Jesus answered him, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above.' 4Nicodemus said to him, 'How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?' 5Jesus answered, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. 6What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. 7Do not be astonished that I said to you, "You must be born from above." 8The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.' 9Nicodemus said to him, 'How can these things be?' 10Jesus answered him, 'Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

11'Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. 12If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? 13No one has ascended into heaven except the one who

descended from heaven, the Son of Man. 14And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, 15that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. 16For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. 17Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.'

Thought for the week



We read in today's gospel: God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

So often God is depicted as the almighty judge – just waiting to catch people, out and tell us how bad we have been.

Jesus makes it clear that His father God is not like that. God sent Jesus not to condemn, but to redeem, to love and to model for the peoples of the world a better way to live.

Nicodemus comes to Jesus under cover of darkness to find out

more about him – but is very confused at the idea of being 'born again' (to a new and better way of living). We use the language of re-birth today at baptisms and perhaps as we journey through Lent it might be helpful for us to allow God to re-birth us each new day and to turn away from an image of a judgemental God, allowing Him instead to love, heal and restore us to new ways of living.

- That we may keep a holy Lent.

The Beatitudes, the incredible manifesto from Jesus recorded in the Sermon on the Mount, are our guide to living well and a great way of exploring faith... whatever stage of the journey we're on.

Taking place this Lent, **Come and See** is a series of daily emails and a short video to watch each Sunday. The emails include a scripture reading, a reflection from the bishop and a daily moment to pause and be encouraged before the busyness of the day begins. Now in its third year Come and See is hugely popular, thanks in part to its deceptively simple approach.

Whether you're exploring faith for the first time or have been coming to church for many years, just five minutes a day using the Come and See materials promises to be lifegiving, and life changing.

Please note that this is a different email address as we cannot access the other. So, **if you have already** sent articles, please would you re-send to this address.





Stations of the Cross





This short (40 min) devotional service follows Our Lord on his final journey from his being condemned to death, to his crucifixion and his burial. Along the way, Jesus encounters his Mother Mary, Veronica who wipes his face, Simon of Cyrene who helps to carry his cross, and the Women of Jerusalem.

Each Thursday / Sunday devotion is self-contained and uses prayers, bible readings and reflections to enter into the meaning for us in our own day of Jesus' Way of the Cross.
