Week commencing: 9th April, Easter Sunday

As we approach the end of Holy Week, the **church will be open** for private prayer and quiet between 7.30 pm and 9 pm Wednesday and Thursday and anyone is welcome to drop in.

On **Maundy Thursday**, at our service of Holy Communion, we will be offering hand or foot washing for any who wish for this. You may prefer to bring your own hand towel for this service. we will also be offering the chalice for any who wish to receive from it – alongside the usual intincted wafers. Following the service, we are invited to keep watch in church until 11.45 when Compline will be said, and the church locked at midnight. You are welcome to come and go for the Watch, but please do not leave the service until the reading of the Gospel of the Watch is completed. There are Bible readings that can be read and meditated upon during the Watch and these are attached with this weekly sheet for you to download to a device.

On **Good Friday** we are invited to join the Walk of Witness in town, meet outside Sainsburys for an 11 am start.

Here in church we then have a service of quiet reflection at 1 pm and then the Liturgy of the Last Hour at 2pm. All are welcome at either or both services. If you ate just coming to the 2pm service please wait for the earlier one to finish before coming into church, thank you. Evening Prayer will be said at 3.15pm and the church will then be locked for the night.

The Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services will all be zoomed – use the Sunday morning link.

On **Easter day** we have a Dawn service at 6.30 am – meet by the pond in Kidwells park (wear warm clothing!) and then do join us for croissants and coffee in church. There will be an 8.00 am Holy Communion service with the lighting of the Paschal Candle and then our main service (which will be zoomed as usual) is at 10 am.

The Collect

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise and honour, glory and might, now and in all eternity.

Post Communion

God of Life, who for our redemption gave your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross, and by his glorious resurrection have delivered us from the power of our enemy: grant us so to die daily to sin, that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his risen life; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Readings for Sunday

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles

34Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius. 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, 35but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. 36You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. 37That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: 38how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. 39We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; 40but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, 41not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. 42He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. 43All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.' *Acts 34-43*

The Gospel reading

1After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. 2And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. 3His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. 4For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. 5But the angel said to the women, 'Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. 6He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. 7Then go quickly and tell his disciples, "He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him." This is my message for you.' 8So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. 9Suddenly Jesus met them and said, 'Greetings!' And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshipped him. 10Then Jesus said to them, 'Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me.'

Thought for the week

The death of a loved one is always a shock, even if it has been imminent. For Jesus' family and disciples, the pain of his death was clearly acute. They believed it was final and that they would never see him again.

And so, as news of his resurrection began to circulate, they needed to know that it was true and not some further trick devised by his enemies, nor just wishful thinking on the part of the disciples.

As reality dawned, they were able to celebrate and to share 40 days with him before his return to heaven.



We don't have that luxury today in the loss of our loved ones, but we do have the assurance that Jesus' death and resurrection brought about a massive change in the order of things and made possible eternal life, with God.

In the words of St. Paul in 1 Thess. 4.13-14 '... we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died'.

DISCOVER WHAT JOSEPHUS REPORTED ABOUT JESUS

Hosting Ukrainian families: There is a small number of Ukrainian families in Maidenhead who need our support. Can you help?

We are looking for six families who can each host a family of two or three Ukrainians who are at risk of becoming homeless. The government offers financial support to hosts of £350 per month rising to £500 per month for Ukrainians who have been in the UK for a year or more. The support should be enough to help offset the rising cost of living.

There is hope that the situation in Ukraine is starting to stablilise. If so, it should be safe enough for the families to return in the coming months. By providing a temporary home, you can make a significant difference in the lives of these families who have likely experienced trauma and stress due to the ongoing conflict.
